4th Annual Shark Fest – August 15, 2021

National Fossil Day - October 13, 2021

This was the first year that NHSM hosted an event to celebrate National Fossil Day, an annual celebration held to highlight the scientific and educational value of paleontology and the importance of preserving fossils for future generations. Several educational displays featuring dinosaur teeth, tracks, and coprolite as well as a look at plant evolution through the fossil record were on display. Folks were invited to bring in fossils for ID. All visitors left with a bag of fossils that were the foundation of a follow-up Zoom fossil tutorial held 2 weeks later.

World Turtle Day – May 23, 2021

World Turtle Day 2021 was the first in-person on-site event since the start of the pandemic. Attendees had the opportunity to interact with at least nine species of turtle, learn about ongoing conservation efforts to support turtle populations in Maryland, see select specimens from the NHSM collection- including the first bog turtle found in Maryland in 1940, and have the opportunity to feed and be photographed with a giant mountain tortoise.

World Turtle Day was founded in 1990 as an annual observance to help people celebrate and protect turtles and tortoises and their disappearing habitats around the world. Maryland has a total of 22 species of turtle, 19 of which are native.

Founder's Day Celebrates NHSM Contributions to Archaeology

In 1929, a group of men interested in the natural sciences broke away from the Maryland Academy of Sciences and formed the Natural History Society of Maryland. The Society's Charter was officially signed on April 2nd of that year. Dr. Lisa Kraus, NHSM Archaeology Curator presented on her predecessor, Richard Stearns who was NSHM Archaeology Curator for more than 30 years, a pioneer in Maryland archeology, and instrumental in recording much of Maryland prehistory.
